After Abraham Lincoln was elected president, the voting citizens of Marion County unanimously opted for the secession of Texas from the Union. The men of Jefferson volunteered for military service in great numbers, pledging their allegiance to the Confederacy. During the War Between the States, Jefferson served as a vital supply point for the South.

Each reunion basically follows the same schedule. Friday March 7th is arrival day. There will be a casual evening dinner for those arrivals.




